An amazing achievement.





"Repetition" is the key how to keep your languages going this summer

Recently in an article in the "Big Issue", **Duolingo** was once again hailed the most popular education app. A huge number of people (around 15 million) — old and young - started learning a new language during lockdown last year using the application. The thirst for learning a new language or returning to a language they once learnt, has continued.

This is probably a lot to do with the fact that being successful in your chosen language is addictive. I myself have been learning Dutch, German and Welsh over the past few years.

But don't take my word for it.

Here is what one of our Year 10 students had to say about learning using apps:

"During these few months (lockdown 3) I've been learning European Portuguese as my fifth language as I already know other languages. I haven't learnt much but I'm taking my time to really learn this language as the pronunciation of some words and phrases can be hard, I use apps like Duolingo, Memrise and watching a couple of YouTube videos and I try to learn new words or phrases a day as it keeps me motivated. In the future I would maybe like to learn German and French." *Christabell Amanfo 10BM*

There are many other students in our school community who have taken advantage of using an app to enhance their learning of a new language.

This year we have been trialling use of the app **Memrise** with our classes and it has been a huge success across different year groups. Some students have scored several hundred thousand points! Well done to everyone who has given this a go, especially if you have done it weekly or even daily. We are really proud of your efforts.

So, over the summer, if you are keen to improve or even if you feel you lack confidence with your language learning why not give a language application a try. Set your learning goals at your own pace and reap the benefits using new technology.

WhyNotLangs@A level Year 10 Event

17 of Stanborough's most talented French and Spanish linguists in Year 10, who are predicted a high grade at GCSE in MFL, were chosen to attend a webinar run by Cambridge university on Wednesday 7th July 2021. The aim was to encourage them to think about studying a language in the future at A-Level or starting a new one from scratch at University.

Recruiting students for A-Level languages is a national problem and so this was an opportunity for our students to see why pursuing MFL at a higher level could be an advantage and what it would entail.

Here are some of the students' accounts below.

"I found that the webinar was a good chance to hear first-hand, from university students, what it is like to learn languages for a degree. We also had an Italian taster session where we were taught some useful phrases as well information on Italian culture. The webinar was a fantastic experience, helping me look at a possible career in languages." *Oliver Holbourns*

"The webinar was an amazing opportunity and it introduced me to a possible future career in linguistics...it also gave me an insight to what university life is like while studying languages." *James Flint*

"I thought the webinar was very useful for me. It was interesting to learn about university language courses that I could take in the future. I also enjoyed the taster lesson in Italian!" *Thomas Linger*

"I thoroughly enjoyed taking part in the language webinar. I especially enjoyed learning about how languages can be taken in addition to a main course such as studying Arabic. It will definitely be useful to think about when I choose my A level options." *Mohammed Aswania*

"We also got to see the trips that students went on as part of the course and that made A-Level languages really appealing." *Aamina Hussain*

So all in all a positive experience for all students. I hope that a few choose to continue with A-Level languages in the future or maybe a new language as a subsidiary subject at university. They won't regret it!

Post 18 Research Journey

On Tuesday 13th of July, Year 12 students began their journey towards Post 18 pathways. During the day several talks proceeded, thanks to the University of Hertfordshire, about how to choose the course you want to study, how to write a successful personal statement, and the intricacies of student finance and loans. Other pathways were explored as well, such as apprenticeships with the help of KEITS, an independent training provider and BT. They showed students the alternatives to university and how diverse the apprenticeship path is; from training into a profession to following a degree apprenticeship.

During the afternoon, students interested in applying to Oxbridge attended a talk from Gonville and Caius College about the application process and life at Cambridge University. For others, an apprenticeship workshop with Ask Apprenticeship informed students about details regarding applying for different apprenticeships and the differences to university. During the last hour of the school day all Year 12 students set up their UCAS profile, as a start to their application process that will commence once they have returned in September.

We would like to thank the Post 16 leadership team and all the speakers present for organising this occasion, creating a smooth start to this overwhelming process that awaits us!

Herts Police E-Scooter Guidance

We understand that buying an e-scooter can be tempting, especially as you can get them from many popular retailers.

However, the current law is clear

You can buy one but you can't ride it on a UK public road, cycle lane or pavement. The only place an e-scooter can be used is on private land.

Why is this?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), so they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements.

What happens if I've been stopped by Police?

The Police will advise you of the current law about how to use an e-scooter legally and ask you to take your e-scooter home. They may however still penalise you depending on the nature and gravity of the offence.

We understand the public's support for environmentally friendly modes of transport. We want to work with the public to make sure the roads are safe for everyone.

The UK Government is currently taking part in 'Future Transport Zone' trials for e-scooter hire, with a view to making them legal to use on the roads.
