

Black History Month

Women Overlooked in the History Books

This week Year 9 have reflected on the contribution made by black soldiers in WW1 whilst facing prejudice and Y8 exploded a long held myth that everyone in Tudor England was white. "Those that the history books overlooked."

Black History month reminds us to shine a light on the less well known achievers and inventors who may have had their contributions ignore or distorted due to prejudice. This week it's the girls turn as we celebrate three black women.



Alice Augusta Ball

Alice Augusta Ball was an African American chemist who developed the first successful treatment for those suffering from Hansen's disease (leprosy). Ball was also the very first African American and the first woman to graduate with a M.S. degree in chemistry from the College of Hawaii (now known as the University of Hawaii) The "Ball Method" was so successful, leprosy patients were discharged from hospitals and facilities across the globe. Thanks to Alice Ball, these banished individuals could now return to their families, free from the symptoms of leprosy.



Ella Baker

Ella Baker became one of the leading figures of the civil rights movement of the 1950s and '60s. Following her early work for the NAACP, she was among the founders of Martin Luther King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference in 1957. Three years later, she helped launch the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee. While not as well-known as Martin Luther King and other famed leaders of the civil rights movement, Baker was a powerful behind-the-scenes force that ensured the success of some of the movement's most important organisations and events. Her name lives on through the Ella Baker Centre for Human Rights, which aims to combat the problems of mass incarceration and strengthen communities for minorities and low-income people.



Mae C Jemison

Mae C. Jemison is an American astronaut and physician who, on June 4, 1987, became the first African American woman to be admitted into NASA's astronaut training program. Having worked as a general practitioner and as the area Peace Corps medical officer for Sierra Leone and Liberia, she followed a dream she had nurtured for a long time: she applied for admission to NASA's astronaut training program. The *Challenger* disaster of January 1986 delayed the selection process, but when she reapplied a year later, Jemison was one of the 15 candidates chosen from a field of about 2,000.On September 12, 1992, Jemison finally flew into space with six other astronauts aboard the *Endeavour* on mission STS47, becoming the first African American woman in space. In recognition of her accomplishments, Jemison has received several awards and honorary doctorates.

Mountfitchet Castle describes itself as a unique open-air museum experience where the visitor can travel back in time over 900 years and truly witness life in a medieval Motte and Bailey castle.

Diwali

Mr Collinson, Subject Leader for Religion, Philosophy & Ethics writes:

Diwali, also spelled Divali, is one of the major religious festivals in Hinduism, Jainism, and Sikhism, lasting for five days, which usually falls in late October and November. The name is derived from the Sanskrit term *dipavali*, meaning "row of lights." The festival generally symbolizes the victory of light over darkness. The third day of Diwali is celebrated on Monday, October 24, 2022.

During the festival, diyas (small earthenware lamps filled with oil) are lit and placed in rows along the parapets of temples and houses and set adrift on rivers and streams. Homes are decorated, and floors inside and out are covered with rangoli, consisting of elaborate designs made of coloured rice, sand, or flower petals. The doors and windows of houses are kept open in the hope that Lakshmi will find her way inside and bless the residents with wealth and success. Diwali is generally a time for visiting, exchanging gifts, wearing new clothes, feasting, feeding the poor, and setting off fireworks.

Each religion marks different historical events and stories:

Hindus celebrate the return of deities Rama and Sita to Ayodhya after their 14-year exile. They also celebrate the day Mother Goddess Durga destroyed a demon called Mahisha.

Sikhs particularly celebrate the release from prison of the sixth guru Hargobind Singh in 1619. But Sikhs celebrated the festival before this date. In fact, the foundation stone of the Golden Temple at Amritsar, the most holy place in the Sikh world, was laid on Diwali in 1577.

The founder of Jainism is Lord Mahavira. During Diwali, Jains celebrate the moment he reached a state called Moksha (nirvana, or eternal bliss).
