

## **'A Little History of Art'** by Charlotte Mullins





### be exhibited at St Albans Museum and Gallery from 1<sup>st</sup> January 16<sup>th</sup> April.

Henry Moore is famous for his sculpture, particularly of women and abstract forms. His drawings of London's sheltering from the Blitz are also well known. But it is often forgotten that Moore was the son of a coalminer from Castleford in Yorkshire, and as a war artist, he developed a detailed series of drawings from sketches he made at the mine where his farther had worked.
