Congratulations to everyone who entered the competition.








House Update

Neurodiversity Week 13th – 19th March 2023

Next week Stanborough students are revisiting what **Neurodiversity** means. As a school we have celebrating neurodiversity week for four years.

Neurodiversity is a term given to a group of learning and mental health differences which are considered to be part of a normal spectrum of brain function. We have labels to describe when a person has significant differences like autism, dyslexia, dyspraxia. However all these labels are simply describing a group of needs or differences in functioning or processing within a neurotypical world.

What is Normal? There is no normal. Neurodiversity helps us to see everyone as different, it helps us realise people's potential and see their individual strengths and skills rather than focusing on what they can't do or what they find hard.



The neurodiversity of our students is very important to us.

We believe in the value and importance of neurodiversity and that individuals should be treated as unique individuals.

We do not treat labels, we look at individual needs and promote their strengths and value their differences.

Happy Neurodiversity week to all the wonderful students, parents and staff at Stanborough School.

Let's celebrate our uniqueness and support each other's wonderful diversity.



The diagram shows a pond.




Diagram NOT accurately drawn

The pond is in the shape of a sector of a circle.


Tina is going to put edging on the perimeter of the pond.




