This policy is set within the school's four principles of:

High Expectations Quality Learning Mutual Respect Success for All

Admission Arrangements for 2027-28

The school will have a published admission number of 240 permanently, but with the addition of rule 6 added temporarily for 2 to 3 years to support the County-led proposals for school expansion to meet demand in the district of Hatfield.

Section 324 of the Education Act 1996 requires the governing bodies of all maintained schools to admit a child with an EHC (Education, Health and Care) Plan that names the school.

Rule 1 Children looked after and children who were previously looked after, including those who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England, and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted or becoming subject to a child arrangements order¹ or a special guardianship order²

Places are allocated to children in public care according to Chapter 7, Section 2 of the School Admissions (Admission Arrangements and Co-ordination of Admission Arrangements) (England) Regulations 2012.

These children will be prioritised under rule 1.

Highest priority will also be given to children who were previously looked after, including those looked after outside England, but ceased to be so because they were adopted, or became subject to a child arrangement order or a special guardianship order.

A "child looked after" is a child who is:

- a) in the care of a local authority, or
- b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (section 22(1) of The Children Act 1989)

All children adopted from care who are of compulsory school age are eligible for admission under rule 1. Children in the process of being placed for adoption are classified by law as children looked after providing there is a Placement Order and the application would be prioritised under Rule 1.

Children who were not "looked after" immediately before being adopted or made the subject of a child arrangement order or special guardianship order, will not be prioritised under rule 1. Applications made for these children, with suitable supporting professional evidence, can be considered under rule 2.

¹ Child arrangements order

Under the provisions of the Children and Families Act 2014, which amended section 8 of the Children Act 1989, residence orders have now been replaced by child arrangements orders which settle the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live.

² Special guardianship order Under 14A of The Children Act 1989, an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian or guardians.

Children previously looked after outside England and subsequently adopted will be prioritised under Rule 1 if the child's previously looked status and adoption is confirmed by Hertfordshire's "Virtual School".

The child's previously looked status will be decided in accordance with the definition outlined in The Children & Social Work Act 2017:

- i. to have been in state care in a place outside England and Wales because he or she would not otherwise have been cared for adequately, and
- ii. to have ceased to be in that state care as a result of being adopted.

A child is in "state care" if he or she is in the care of, or accommodated by -

- a) a public authority,
- b) a religious organisation, or
- c) any other organisation the sole or main purpose of which is to benefit society

Rule 2 Medical or Social: Children for whom it can be demonstrated that they have a particular medical or social need to go to the school.

Rule 2 applications will only be considered at the time of the initial application, unless there has been a significant and exceptional change of circumstances within the family since the initial application was submitted.

Hertfordshire County Council will determine whether the evidence provided is sufficiently compelling to meet the requirements for this rule. The evidence must relate specifically to the school applied for under Rule 2 and must clearly demonstrate why it is the only school that can meet the child's needs.

All schools in Hertfordshire have experience in dealing with children with diverse social and medical needs. However, in a few very exceptional cases, there are reasons why a child has to go to one specific school.

Few applications under Rule 2 are agreed.

All applications are considered individually but a successful application should include the following:

- a) Specific recent professional evidence that justifies why only one school can meet a child's individual needs, and/or
- b) Professional evidence that outlines exceptional family circumstances making clear why only one school can meet the child's needs
- c) If the requested school is not the nearest school to the child's home address clear reasons why the nearest school is not appropriate
- d) For medical cases a clear explanation of why the child's severity of illness or disability makes attendance at only a specific school essential.

Evidence should make clear why only one school is appropriate. A Rule 2 application will generally not be upheld in cases where more than one school could meet the child's need. In exceptional cases relating to a disability, where more than one school in the county can meet the child's specific needs, a clear and compelling case can be made for the "nearest" school with the relevant facilities, environment or location. You must clearly explain why attendance at the "nearest" school with these facilities is essential

Applications under Rule 2 can only be considered when supported by a recent letter from a professional involved with the child or family, for example a doctor, psychologist or police

officer. The supporting evidence needs to demonstrate why only one named school can meet the social/medical needs of the child.

Applications for children who were not "looked after" immediately before being adopted or made the subject of a child arrangement order or special guardianship order may be made under this rule

Further details on the Rule 2 process can be found in the Rule 2 protocol

Rule 3 Sibling: Children who have a sibling at the school at the time of application, unless the sibling is in the last year of the normal age-range of the school. i.e. Year 13 is the designated range for Stanborough School. A sibling is defined as: the sister, brother, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, child of the parent/carer or partner or a child looked after or previously looked after and in every case living permanently in a placement within the home as part of the family household from Monday to Friday at the time of this application.

A sibling must be on the roll of the named school at the time the younger child starts or have been offered and accepted a place.

If a place is obtained for an older child using fraudulent information, there will be no sibling connection available to subsequent children from that family.

Multiple births

The admission authority will admit over the school's published admission number (PAN) when a single twin/multiple birth child is allocated the last place at a school.

- Rule 4 Children of staff who work at the school at the time of application. A member of teaching staff and non-teaching staff is defined as a person who has a full-time or part-time permanent contract of employment at the School at the time of application. The Governing Body will give priority in their oversubscription criteria to children of staff in either or both of the following circumstances:
 - a. Where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made, and/or
 - b. The member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.

Please note that the child must be living at the same address as the staff member, children of partners will be included.

Children who live in the Priority Area with a proven aptitude in Music. The Musical Aptitude Tests, for those children who wish to be considered for a place based on musical ability, will take place in June of the preceeding academic year i.e. in June 2026 for the 2027/28 academic year. Students who apply for the test must live in the priority area for the school as shown on the table on page 5. Up to ten percent of the PAN (24 places) will be allocated on the basis of both a written musical aptitude test and a performance musical aptitude test.

Parents will be notified of the results of these tests before the Local Authority closing date for the return of Common Application Forms (CAFs) on 31st October 2026. If, on receiving these results, parents decide they wish to apply to the school, they must list it as one of their

preferences on their home Local Authority CAF. Parents should be aware that the results of the test do not guarantee a place at the school. A reserve list will operate in strict merit order, from which subsequent offers will be made, should there be any withdrawals. In the event of a tie for the final place(s), priority will be given to those students living in closest proximity to the school, using the home school measurement system used by Hertfordshire County Council. If a student is a Hatfield resident and admitted under Rule 5, the student will not count under Rule 7.

- Rule 6 Children who live in the priority area for whom it is their nearest Hertfordshire maintained school or academy that is non-faith, co-educational and non-partially selective. Note: Non-partially selective means that the school does not offer any places based on academic ability.
- Rule 7 The allocation of 30 places for children whose permanent address is in Hatfield will be allocated (Hatfield is defined by the administrative town boundary). If there are more applications than places available, allocations will be made on a random basis.
- Rule 8 Children who live in the priority area who live nearest to the school.
- Rule 9 Children living outside the priority area on the basis of distance, with those living nearest to the school given priority.

These rules are applied in the order they are printed above. If more children qualify under a particular rule than there are places available, a tie-break will be used by applying the next rule to those children. Where there is a need for a tie-breaker where two different addresses measure the same distance from a school, in the case of a block of flats for example the lower door number will be deemed nearest as logically this will be on the ground floor and therefore closer. If there are two identical addresses of separate applicants, the tie-break will be random. Every child entered onto the HCC admissions database has an individual random number assigned, between 1 and 1 million, against each preference school. When there is a need for a final tie break the random number is used to allocate the place, with the lowest number given priority.

Priority Areas

The priority areas in the admission rules are based on the towns, parishes/unparished areas shown below. These apply to Rules 5 to 8.

Home to School Distance Measurement for Purposes of Admissions

A 'straight line' distance measurement is used in all home to school distance measurements for the school by the County Council. Distances are measured using a computerised mapping system to two decimal places. The measurement is taken from the AddressBase Premium address point of your child's house to the address point of the school. AddressBase Premium data is a nationally recognised method of identifying the location of schools and individual residences.

Musical Aptitude Test (for full details see school website, <u>Admissions – Stanborough School</u>

The Musical Aptitude Test (MAT) dates are in the Summer term prior to the year of application (i.e. the summer of Year 5, June 2026 for admission in Sept. 2026). In the Autumn term (of Year 6), there will be an additional test date for MAT late applicants only (see below for more information). Anyone wishing to apply under this criterion must complete and return the Supplementary Information Form (SIF -which can be found below on page 9 and 10 and on the school website) to the School by the relevant deadline shown in the table below.

Allocation of places: Letters or emails will be sent out by the local education authority to all parents who have applied using the CAF.

- 1. This SIF form (page 9 and 10) must be completed for all applicants including online applications. The September date is our final deadline. A MAT late applicant would be someone who was registered for the summer tests, but, for unavoidable reasons was unable to sit the test in the Summer of Year 5. As an example, an unavoidable reason would include: a religious holiday or pre-arranged school trip that clashed with the test date, illness on the test date, backed up by a doctor's note, or the bereavement of a close family member at the time of the summer tests.
- 2. After the tests have been completed and following the publication of the results, anyone wishing to continue with their application for a place on the basis of musical aptitude must ensure that Stanborough School is included as a preference on the Common Application Form (CAF) and submitted to their home Local Authority (available at www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/admissions for families resident in Hertfordshire). This must be done by the national deadline date of 31 October 2026.
- 3. The musical aptitude test is in two parts. All students who apply under this criterion will be invited to sit a written aptitude test. Following the aptitude test, some students will be invited to complete a 5-minute performance. Both the written and performance aptitude tests will take place at Stanborough School. Exact timings will be confirmed via email before the tests. If the school is unable to accommodate all applicants on the given date, a further date will be arranged. There are no practice papers for the Music Test.

Musical Aptitude Test 1:

This is a written test, taken with other children, and is approximately 30 minutes in duration. The test is based entirely on aural responses. There are no practice papers for the test.

There are 60 questions of four types: Pitch, Melody, Texture and Rhythm

Pitch

For these questions, candidates listen to two sounds and have to indicate whether the second sound is the same as the first, or whether it is higher or lower. Some of the pitches are less than a semitone apart i.e., very close together.

20 questions.

Melody

For these questions, candidates listen to two tunes consisting of five notes. Candidates have to decide whether the second tune is the same as the first or if one of the notes has been altered. If there is a change, candidates will be expected to identify which note has been altered, by giving the number of the note.

10 questions.

Texture

For these questions, candidates listen to a number of notes, played together at the same time (a chord). Candidates need to decide whether or not each chord has two, three or four notes.

20 questions.

Rhythm

For these questions, candidates listen to two patterns of notes and have to decide whether the second pattern is the same as, or different from, the first and where any difference occurs. Each rhythm will be four beats (or pulses) in length.

10 questions.

Musical Aptitude Test 2:

In addition to the written aptitude test, candidates will be required to complete a musical performance aptitude test. Each child is allocated a five minute slot, in that time they will perform on their preferred instrument/s (voice included) and speak to the panel. There is a totally free choice of piece/s, enabling candidates of all cultures an equal chance to succeed. They may also perform on more than one instrument if they prefer.

We can provide an accompanist if required or you may bring your own. There is also provision to play a backing track (USB/MP3). Please note for vocal performances this should be a backing track only and not have the original artist singing.

Other Information Relating to Both Parts of the Test:

Parents of children who have special educational or medical needs, which may require the school to make particular provision for the tests must provide written evidence of the child's normal way of working from their current school's Headteacher.

This evidence must be sent by the deadline date as advised. Parents will be informed in advance of the test date of any appropriate special arrangements that will be made for their child. Every effort will be made to ensure that the tests are accessible and fair to all children.

Children that are medically unfit on the test day (a medical certificate will be required) or have religious reasons for being unable to attend (evidence will be required) will be offered one further date to attend.

- Notification must be withing 24 hours of the tests taking place.
- A child may only take the Aptitude Tests for admission to Year 7 once.

Continuing Interest (Year 7 places)

After places have been offered, Hertfordshire County Council will maintain a continuing interest (waiting) list for all community and voluntary controlled schools. A child's position on a CI list will be determined by the admission criteria outlined above and a child's place on the list can be changed as other children join or leave it. The county council will contact parents/carers if a vacancy becomes available and it can be offered to a child. Continuing interest lists will be maintained for every year group until the summer term (date to be specified and confirmed to parents at the time of allocation). To remain on the CI (waiting) list after this time, parents must confirm they are still interested in a place by completing an In Year application form.

In-Year Admissions

The County Council will co-ordinate Stanborough School's In-Year admissions. Application Forms can be accessed via www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/admissions or from the Customer Service Centre, 0300 123 4043. Parents should return the application form direct to the County Council (address on the form). For all In-Year Admissions, a meeting with the Headteacher will be arranged to ensure that the transition process is as smooth as possible for the family and any support the child requires can be put in place to ensure the child thrives at Stanborough.

Admissions Out of Year Group

DfE guidance states that "in general, children should be educated in their normal age group". If parents/carers believe their child(ren) should be educated in a different year group they should, at the time of application, submit supporting evidence from relevant professionals working with the child and family stating why the child must be placed outside their normal age appropriate cohort. DfE guidance makes clear that "it is reasonable for admission authorities to expect parents to provide them with information in support of their request – since without it they are unlikely to be able to make a decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case". A Governors' panel will decide whether the application will be accepted on the basis of the information submitted. The panel will make decisions based upon the circumstances of each case including the view of parents, the Headteacher, the child's social, academic and emotional development and whether the child has been previously educated out of year group. There is no guarantee that an application will be accepted on this basis. If the application is not accepted this does not constitute a refusal of a place and there is no right to an independent statutory appeal. Similarly there is no right of appeal for a place in a specific year group at a school. The internal management and organisation of a school, including the placement of pupils in classes, is a matter for the Headteacher and senior leadership of individual schools. The governing body is ultimately responsible for making this decision for applications made to the school.

Children will be admitted to the school in Year 7 at the age of 11 irrespective of physical or academic ability or age 12 if they are summer born children where a family chose to delay their entry to Reception by an academic year.

Fair Access

The school participates in the County Council's Fair Access protocol and will admit children under this protocol before children on the continuing interest list and over PAN (Published Admission Number) if necessary.

HCC fair Access Protocol 2023 (Hertfordshire.gov.uk)

Home Address

The address provided must be the child's current permanent address at the time of application

- At the time of application" means the closing date for applications
- "Permanent" means that the child has lived at that address for at least a year

Where a family has not lived at an address for a year, they must be able to demonstrate that they own the property or have a tenancy agreement for a minimum of 12* months and the child must be resident in the property at the time of application.

The application can only be processed using one address. If a child lives at more than one address (for example due to a separation) the address used will be the one where the child lives for the majority of the time. If a child lives at two addresses equally, parents/carers should make a single joint application naming one address.

If a child's permanent residence is disputed, parents/carers should provide court documentation to evidence the address that should be used for admission allocation purposes. If two applications are received, with different addresses and/or different preferences, neither will be processed until the address issue is reconciled.

It is for a child's home Local Authority to determine address. If two applications, with different addresses are received from the same Local Authority, it will be for that Local Authority to determine permanent address. If two applications are received from two different Local Authorities, the above process will be used.

If two different applications are received for the same child from the same address, e.g., containing different preferences, parents/carers will be invited to submit a joint application or provide court documentation to evidence the preferences that should be used for the admission process. Until the preference issue is reconciled neither application will be processed.

For the transfer application rounds, if the initial differing applications (one or both) were received "on-time", an amended joint application will also be considered "on-time" if received before the "late deadline". If the amended joint application is received after the late date, it will be treated as "late". The late deadlines for the 2027/28 transfer application process is December 2026. If these dates change, amendments will be published on the admissions web pages at the start of the 2027/28 application process in September 2026.

* If, because of the nature of the agreement, it is not possible to provide a 12-month tenancy agreement, alternative proof of address will be requested and verified as necessary with the Shared Anti-Fraud Service

Appeals

At transfer time parents wishing to appeal who applied on line should log into their online application and click on the link 'register an appeal'. Out of county residents and paper applicants should call the Customer Service Centre on 0300 123 4043 to request their registration details and log into www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/schoolappeals and click on the link "log into the appeals system".

For in-year applications, Hertfordshire County Council will write to you with the outcome of your application and if you have been unsuccessful, they will include registration details to enable you to login and appeal online at www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/schoolappeals.

Minimum entry requirements are different for different levels of courses, for which please see the grid below, and full details can be found in the Welwyn Hatfield Consortium prospectus.

If the school is oversubscribed, priority will first be given to:

- i) Children looked after or previously looked after to include children previously looked after by the state abroad
- ii) Medical or Social.
- iii) Sibling
- iv) Children of staff
- v) Students who live nearest the school

If more children qualify under a particular rule than there are places available, a tiebreak will be used by applying the next rule to those children.

Course allocation and acceptance into the consortium

The consortium intends to deliver the courses offered in the blocking form. If student uptake numbers are very low for a class then the course may not run. During this academic year there may be a need to change the subjects offered in the blocks. Students will be informed of any course closures or block changes that affect their choices. Students are expected to choose classes at their home site wherever this fits with their other choices.

Applications from external students will be subject to academic references from the school they attend in Year 11. Offers will only be made upon receipt of these references and a successful interview. In the case of any behavioral concerns being raised, the site applied for will conduct a risk assessment before any offer is made.

The consortium reserves the right to reject an application from a student who has been permanently excluded from any of the consortium schools, regardless of which school they are applying to.

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Progression to Year 13

It is important for all students to be on the correct courses that can give them the best possible outcomes. Students starting Advanced Level subjects in September 2026 are expected to achieve at least a D grade in two subjects to progress to their second year. These grades will be determined through internally set end of Year 12 exams.

If this standard is not met there will be a review of, and possible amendment to, that student's course provision. As part of the review, the student's attitude to work and their attendance will be considered. Attendance at a student's home site's programme of activities on Wednesday afternoons and/or Friday mornings is compulsory and this will also be taken into consideration when reviewing progression. Any changes made to course provision will be in the best interests of the student's potential achievement; full support will be given should there be a need for a change of course or institution.

Changes in staffing or student numbers can occasionally necessitate amendments to a student's timetable. This can lead to a student needing to move blocks or teaching sites, or to groups being combined. We will always aim to keep any disruption to teaching and learning to a minimum in these circumstances.

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The school is required to hold student application data for regulatory purposes. The information will only be disclosed to the Department for Education, the Local Authority and approved agencies if required. Consortium schools will also share students' details including prior attainment, SEND, pupil premium, priority one contact details, medical information. School MIS users and administrators will have access with appropriate permission levels
